



29% engage in boating on a weekly basis




Most popular locations for boating:

# Recreational boating in SA

# **Boating safety**

65% felt it was safe while 14% felt it was unsafe.

**38%** of those who boat daily exhibit a lower perception of safety compared to **72%** of those who boat less frequently, such as once a month.

This suggests boating more often may lead to seeing more unsafe behaviours by others out on the water.



# When prompted about recreational boating safety

49% are concerned that public awareness of boat safety is lacking.
44% are concerned about the lack of boating safety knowledge for boaters.
42% are concerned with speeding.
36% are concerned with limited training for boaters.



#### Licensing and training changes



supported at least one improvement to boating safety knowledge.

The provision of jet ski education courses was most supported in improving boating safety knowledge:



#### Support in improving boating safety knowledge



Provision of specific personal watercraft (commonly known as jetski) practical courses for safely operating a personal watercraft

(commonly known as jetski) theory courses for safely operating a personal watercraft

#### Boat licensing for young people (12 – 15 years)

**51%** were in support of the current option which allows 12- to-15-year-olds the opportunity to gain a Special Permit to operate under the supervision of a full boat licence holder with restrictions until they turn 16 years old (requiring a theory test).



Support was strongest for these operational restrictions for young boat licence holders (12 – 15 years) when operating solo:



53%

restricting boat operations to daylight hours.



restricting young boaters to operating closer to shore on coastal waters (i.e. only operating up to 2 nautical miles from the shore and inland).





# Consultation

#### Council consultation

27 South Australian Councils have restricted areas and controls under the Harbors and Navigation Regulations 2023.



Councils were **contacted** to gain feedback on these restricted areas and controls.

Councils responded with general support for an Councils responded with general support increase in compliance and education activities, greater signage, and safer sh activities, greater signage, and safer shared areas on the water such as keeping or extending 4-knot speed zone.



# **Key Government and Non-Government forums**

Key online survey findings and draft priority areas were presented to different government and non-government organisations and recreational boating associations.



Different organisations attended the **forums** held on 23 to 24 May 2024 and 5 June 2024.

Feedback was incorporated into refining priority areas and proposed actions.
